Peter passed away in Masterton on 20 May aged 95 – our oldest competitive member. After migrating from UK to Masterton where he joined the Masterton Harrier Club, Peter moved to Wellington in the 1960s. He joined Scottish Harriers, as a runner, but then as an enthusiastic race walker. Peter became involved in many administrative aspects of both Scottish and the Wellington Centre. He was the resident Delegate for Masterton at Centre meetings for many years.

He was Scottish & Centre start & finish area coordinator for cross country & road. He travelled regularly to Veterans events and donated the Tearle Trophy, still competed for by the walkers.

At Newtown Park he and Murray Gowans for many seasons ran the Pole Vault – one of the most demanding events to officiate. Their expertise was recognised by appointment at the Commonwealth Games in Auckland in 1990. An active Master's competitor initially in walks, then field events which enabled him to participate into his early 90's.

Clive was a long-time member of Hutt Harriers along with his brother. For many years Clive was the secretary for the Wellington Centre Cross Country and Road committee. In latter years he moved to reside in Whanganui after he became a Methodist Minister for some years. He passed away in hospital during May this year in his 80's after having suffering illness for a sometime.



BOARD REPORT

There was plenty of uncertainty coming into the 2020-21 year as we emerged from the Covid-19 enforced lockdown in New Zealand. However, following the Governments motto of going hard and going early, we were able to enjoy our sport in relative normality compared to the rest of the world.

The athletics community has come together and ensured that people could enjoy the sport they love. I would like to thank all the volunteers within our sport that have made athletics possible in 2020-21. Particularly the Athletics Wellington Committee's that went above and beyond to develop guidelines to allow some of our competitions and races to go ahead under Alert Level 2 when numbers allowed.

To assist with ensuring club sustainability and to minimise the barriers for individuals participating in sport post the Covid-19 lockdown, the Board agreed to waive the Athletics Wellington levy for 2020-21. This decision kept upwards of \$45,000 in the clubs and with the individual members.

Despite this decision, Athletics Wellington was able to post a relatively strong financial result. When considering that we did not collect any levies during 2020-21, we posted an operating loss of \$17,484. In addition to this, Athletics Wellington also spent \$23,000 on Newtown Park equipment, including a new discuss cage. This resulted in an overall cash investment back into the sport of \$31,000 during the past year. This investment ensures we have high quality equipment that not only assists with the enjoyment of our local athletes but also allows us to host national events which will showcase some of the best athletes in New Zealand.

Mid-way through the year, Karin Burger resigned to move south to further her netball career. I would like to thank Karin for her work during her time with Athletics Wellington and wish her all the best with her future endeavours. This resignation however enabled the Board to review the direction we wanted to go with the Athletics Wellington employee. After robust discussions, the Board decided to move from the Sport Development Manager to a General Manager. We are excited with the appointment of Tony Rogers who brings with him a wealth of athletics knowledge as well as an excellent understanding of the sport sector in general.

As we look towards the 2021-22 season, there is plenty to be excited about. Athletics Wellington will be finalising our next Strategic Plan which will guide our objectives over the next 4-5 years as well as hosting the North Island Colgate Games in early 2022.

Finally, I would like to thank my fellow Board members. Their passion and commitment ensure that we continue to grow opportunities for Wellingtonians to participate in and enjoy athletics.

MANAGEMENT

As incoming General Manager for Athletics Wellington's newly established position in early March, the role's key focus initially is to support the Board to drive the development and promotion of athletics in the greater Wellington region. Working with the Board to continue to develop sustainable systems and structures along reviewing of its current strategic plan, planning it future development, socialise with our people, then implementation of the next steps for growth of Wellington Athletics.

This work includes management of and working with the three key committees of Track & Field, Cross Country & Road and Juniors, and other identified sport leads for equipment, officiating and coaching to provide vital insights through the General Manager to the board to support strong and informed governance.



In reviewing the day-to-day operations of the organisation, a priority identified is the need to ensure that the Track & Field programme is reinvigorated. To enable this, support of an inclusive culture for all stakeholders, athletes, coaches and very importantly officials is critical to assist with delivery of events and athletic opportunities.

Work in the early weeks has seen increased collaboration with Athletics NZ, supporting best practices for safe environments in our sport for participants. Identifying relationship requirements and establishing working relationship with key local organisations Like Nuku Ora, College Sport and Wellington City Council have been valued and important for our organisation. There has been focus on gathering information through an environmental scope from a range of stakeholders to identify current concerns, and work has commenced on ensuring documentation to support retention of Athletics Wellington's history.

Athletics Wellington has many advantages in delivery of major events for stadia and non-stadia from a national perspective and I look forward to continuing to work with local organising committees to bring to Wellington a range of National events in the next 12 – 24 months starting with the LOC of **2022 Colgate Games.** This work will continue to support the growth and visibility of athletics across range of ages and disciplines. On a personal note, with Acesports we will ensure events like the **Team Ledger Harcourts Capital Classic** remain an integral part of the Athletics Wellington and National calendar.

FINANCE

Athletics Wellington started the year in a strong financial position, which made it possible to waive registration levies for the 2020/21 year in order to support clubs and members through COVID-19. This reduced expected income by approximately \$45,000.00.

Despite COVID-19, most other expected income streams for Athletics Wellington were maintained. This was particularly due to the summer season being able to operate largely as normal. Winter event income was reduced, but this was offset by corresponding expense savings. Athletics Wellington was able to claim the Government's COVID-19 wage subsidy, and this provided a welcome \$12,000.00 of income.

The expense for the Sport Development Manager position for the year was much reduced from what was budgeted, due to reduced work hours during the COVID-19 lockdowns and the position being vacant for a couple of months.

An operating loss of \$17,000.00 was recorded to year end 31 March 2021. Athletics Wellington finished the year in a strong financial position with \$252,000.00 of cash deposits (down from \$262,000.00 a year earlier).

The Athletics Wellington financial model used involves each of the three subcommittees largely operating autonomously, with the Board having its own budget but maintaining oversight (and a degree of control consistent with good governance) of the subcommittees. All external funding applications are signed off by the Board. Significant funding has again come from NZ Community Trust for the Sport Development / General Manager role. A grant of \$25,000.00 was received, of which \$14k related to the 2020/21 year.

Sanction fee income from Round the Bays was again \$10k off the back of Athletics Wellington helping with the event. \$10,000.00 was received from Lion Foundation towards Newtown Park hire costs, which was very gratefully received. Grants from Pelorus Trust (\$4,000.00) and Grassroots Trust (\$2,000.00) helped with the costs for the Junior and Youth Interprovincial Teams.

\$14,000.00 was received from allowing hire of Athletics Wellington's equipment (with support from Officials) at Newtown Park to be used by other track users (mainly schools). Investment into equipment at Newtown Park continued during the year, with \$23,000.00 spent on new gear (mainly the discus cage) and \$8,000.00 on maintenance. The other main areas of expenditure during the year were the Sport Development / General Manager position (\$37,000.00), Depreciation of Newtown Park equipment (\$9,000.00), hire of Newtown Park from Wellington City Council (\$11,000.00) and subsidies for our representative teams (\$18,000 offset by the \$6,000.00 of grants).

We acknowledge key work by several people, including the improvement this season of processing and publishing of results due to great work by Anna Ward, Michael du Toit, and the photo-finish team led by Peter Baillie. Live results helped significantly as it allowed parents to identify anomalies immediately and have these investigated and remedied on the day. Special mention to Marshall Clarke for his efforts setting up the AWJC membership database and the AWJC Champs databases. Also Perry Dinnan and Joshua Starkey who helped ensure the smooth running of the AWJC Champs as key people to support the Medal Presentations and Announcer roles respectively.

As a committee we look forward to busy 2021-2022 season, we need to acknowledge our key goal of recruiting and supporting new officials and volunteers and be mindful of the "Balance is Better" approach for our young athletes and need to ensure that the athletes have enjoyment before performance pressures.





TRACK & FIELD COMMITTEE

The severe shortage of track and field officials and helpers during the previous season, created a need that we explore an alternative approach for the 2020-21 season. This was to develop and manage a programme based upon offers received from interested groups and clubs to lead specific events. This meant we would only hold events where groups made commitments to support those events by providing helpers. We outlined this proposed club-led approach to the community in July 2020. The programme for the season was developed based around this approach.

The Kiwi Athletic Club and Sola Power Throwing Academy, co-ordinated by Ross Hanning, led a series of throwers meets through the season. Philip du Toit led and supported race walk events through the season. The throwing and race-walking events were well supported by the local athletes in these disciplines.

Wellington Scottish Athletic Club again hosted a 10,000m Track champs, and this attracted a large field. Scottish also hosted another of their pre-Christmas track meets (the Night of Miles). Andy Forbes from Wellington Scottish also proposed a series of mid-week Twilight Track meets as a new option. These events were a lot of fun and greatly appreciated by those who turned up to compete. Wellington Harrier Athletic Club provided helpers to support several track meets, including a well-supported 5000m champs at the end of the season. Additional events of Long Jump and Triple Jump were added during the season, led by Richard Thomson.

As the season programme was being prepared, it was difficult to find a weekend that might be suitable for a traditional 2-day Wellington T&F Champs that did not clash with other significant events. There was serious concern that it would not be possible to find the number of officials and helpers necessary to mount a two-day Champs including all main track and field events. There was also concern that participation in any Wellington Champs weekend would be low because of the large number of national-level events scheduled in February. An alternative low-key approach was adopted, designating certain specific track and field events as the Wellington Centre Champs for those events.

Many thanks to the officials and helpers who assisted to make the season possible. I particularly want to acknowledge Vaughan Oates, Eddie Soria, and Sione Toi'a. Many thanks also to Mike Ritchie as our Equipment Officer for his constant support throughout the season. Finally, a special thanks to Peter Baillie, we would not have timed track events without his unfailing support. Particular thanks to Peter for supporting the trial of mid-week twilight track meets.

CROSS COUNTRY & ROAD COMMITTEE

The 2020 cross country and road winter season was significantly disrupted by COVID-19. When we were at Alert Levels 3 and 4, all events and gatherings had to be cancelled. Event "bubbles" of up to 100 people were allowed at Alert Level 2, which made it difficult (and in most cases too difficult) to hold our usual interclub events.

We were left with no choice but to cancel a number of our traditional interclub events: Vosseler Shield, Dorne Cup, Shaw Baton Relay, Wellington XC champs. We were fortunately able to reschedule and hold the University Relay and the (new) Needle Relay while at Alert Level 1, and by dividing competitors into 3 separate bubbles we were able to hold the Wellington Road Champs in Wainuiomata.

Participation in the events we did hold was very high, which showed clubs had done an excellent job of retaining members during lockdowns. Plus there was a lot of pent up demand to get back racing and have social interaction after the lockdowns.

A number of NZ championships were cancelled, but 2 champs which did go ahead were the NZ road champs



and NZ road relay. The NZ cross country champs were scheduled to go ahead in Dunedin, but in the week prior it became clear that Auckland athletes would not be able to attend due to alert level restrictions, so Athletics NZ (rightly) removed the championship status of the event. A number of Athletics Wellington athletes still made the trip to Dunedin but were unfortunately denied by COVID-19 of the opportunity to have their performances rewarded with a NZ title or podium place.

The NZ Road Relay in Feilding was a spectacular success, with a very significant number of teams from Wellington clubs and multiple titles won.

Many thanks to all officials, committee members, selectors, team managers and other volunteers for contributing their time and expertise during the year. We had to move all committee meetings to virtual meetings over Zoom, which proved to be effective and allowed for greater attendance than we previously had at our traditional face-to-face meetings. We were operating very much in unchartered territory, and it was particularly pleasing to see everyone coming together with a positive attitude and sharing ideas of how we could get back racing safely.



OFFICIALS

The Centre continues to struggle with a lack of officials, however those that we do have represented Wellington well on the National stage with a strong Wellington presence at the National Secondary School Track & Field Championships in Tauranga in December 2020, the Athletics NZ National Track and Field Championships in Hastings in March this year, followed by the National Interprovincial teams' event for 12and 13-year-olds at Palmerston North at Easter.

Several officials also moved up to level A qualifications following a throws course in Hastings in the early part of the season with Mark Harris also gaining his A level track qualification over the same weekend. Eddie Soria has displayed particular enthusiasm and commitment also gaining level A in jumps over the summer.

The New Zealand Athletics Officials Association completed its dissolution over the summer after voting to come under the umbrella of Athletics NZ at the National Track and Field champs in Christchurch in 2019. Athletics NZ have undertaken to maintain and improve the level of support available to officials in the country with a current move to standardise the delivery of training across the country by having an accredited panel of trainers covering the country.

The Centre has booked in a series of courses to assist us in increasing our pool of officials, a necessity particularly considering Wellington is hosting the North Island Colgate Games in January 2022. It is also hoped another out of stadia course can be run soon to help increase and upskill our pool of cross-country officials.

Last August we were all deeply saddened to hear the news that Keith Bade, a long-standing official for the Centre and the Oceania Federation had died. Keith will always be remembered for his willingness to share his great breadth of experience with newcomers to the world of officiating and his calm unruffled approach to running events at all levels.

Keith was particularly active with the Oceania Federation earning a merit award from Oceania AA in 2012 for his many years of outstanding service to the sport.



MAJOR HONOURS

OCEANIA AA

Alan Stevens was one of two New Zealanders recognised in Oceania Athletics Association's 2020 Merit Awards at OAA December 2020 Council meeting. Known as one of the country's most loyal athletics servants he was one of four OAA recipients, to receive the illustrious honour, which serves to recognise those who have given outstanding service to the sport over a number of years.

"Based on the OAA Merit Award criteria, recipients have made significant contributions to the sport of athletics over a sustained period, not only for their federation but for the Oceania area and internationally."

Alan will forever be a part of an ever-growing list of exceptional people who have contributed to athletics for Oceania on the World stage. In 1991, Alan was elected as an Oceania Area Representative, and a part of the IAAF [World Athletics] Cross County & Road Committee serving16 years continuously to 2007. From 1970 to 1996, Alan was a part of the NZAAA [Athletics NZ] Management Committee and Athletics NZ Board, 26 years in total. From 1977 to 1988, Alan was Convenor for the Cross Country & Road Committee. In 1995, Alan was awarded the IAAF Veteran Pin at World Congress, Goteborg, Sweden.


MAJOR GAMES NEW ZEALAND REPRESENTATIVES

Athletics New Zealand Track & Field Championships

The Championships were originally scheduled from March 5th - 7th but were rescheduled to March 26th& 27th and due to restraints on travel, accommodation, officials and other competition pressures the Under 18 component of the Championship was postponed. The Under 18 Championships has been rescheduled to run concurrently with NZ Secondary Schools Championships in December alongside a newly promoted trial Under 16 Championships.

Athletics Wellington initially selected just over 70 athletes but due to restrictions that were put into place, all U18 athletes was dropped, and some other athletes were unable to make the new date to travel due not being able get off from work or studies when the competition date was changed, so finally a team of just on 36 athletes competed over the two days.

The team came away with nine gold medals, which included James Preston who competed under the Wellington Scottish club colours. A unique family double occurred featuring Wellington siblings with



former Wellington athlete competing out of Auckland now, Scott Thomson who took his first senior title in the triple jump to make a double act in the same discipline with sister Anna claiming the senior women's triple jump. Cody Wilson was rewarded for his excellent sprinting consistency all season behind top sprinters Eddie Nketia and Tiaan Walton who were absent from the championships by claiming gold and silver in the men's sprint double. Seven silver and seven bronze medals were also achieved which was a fine effort with the reduced team size.
